A LETTER FROM THE PASTOR

Easter Monday, April 13, 2009, was certainly an historic milestone in our parish. After years of careful planning, this marked the day we began in earnest the major construction work to renovate and restore our Church. Who will ever forget celebrating Mass first under the scaffolding, then in Hurtado Hall and the Xavier High School Gym during the summer months. And what about that big white curtain!



Parish receptions beginning in May set the stage for our \$2.5M Capital Campaign—*Moving Forward in Renewal, Renovation and Restoration*. At these receptions, tours of the church highlighted the desperate need we had for renovation and restoration. Both the closing video presentation and question and answer session offered an opportunity to explain all that was planned.

It has been exciting to see so many volunteers come forward to help with our parish Capital Campaign. Under the direction of Patrick Brewis, our Capital Campaign director, we have nearly reached our goal. Your generosity has been a real source of blessing. We know that so many have made a real effort to make a pledge or donation.

As the months unfolded and the scaffolding was removed much of our Church's beauty that had been obscured by decades of soot and grime was revealed. The restoration of the stained glass and the addition of new lighting also helped to make the Church shine.

In the months ahead we will see the installation of our new baptismal pool and font; a new organ; a refurbished East/Music Room with an additional bathroom; and also a new altar and ambo crafted from the 130-year-old oak from the kneelers of our original and now restored pews. We are still assessing our finances for when we can complete the badly needed stained glass window restoration in the nave. If you haven't already pledged or donated there is still time and, of course, need! We would truly love to have 100% parishioner participation. We are not there yet, but we still hope for everyone to contribute whatever she or he can to make the dream of total parish participation a reality.

In addition to all the efforts to renovate and restore our Church, we have also been able to maintain all of our parish Outreach Services to the poor and needy of our city. Right before the end of 2009 we successfully repaired and restored the former location of our men's evening shelter. This provides our shelter guests with a much more comfortable space and allows us once again to utilize Hurtado Hall in the evenings. Even in the face of government cutbacks in programs and services, we have moved forward.

Our meetings in 2009 to discuss the renewal of our parish mission statement were also among the moments of great blessing in which the past, present and future of our parish were explored and discussed. At the Rededication Mass of our Church's worship space with Archbishop Timothy Dolan in June 2010, we will adopt this revised mission statement incorporating many of the wonderful elements of our current mission statement.

We are truly a wonderfully dynamic, diverse and welcoming community. My heart is filled with much joy and gratitude to all of you, who contribute so freely and generously in so many varied ways. You make it possible for us to continue *Moving Forward*.

A LETTER FROM THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

We are pleased to present this Annual Report to you for the fiscal year ending August 31, 2009, as a commitment to fiscal transparency and the responsible stewardship of the resources provided so graciously by our brothers and sisters in Christ. We want to thank all of you who have given so much of your time, talent and treasure to our parish in support of our mission even in these difficult economic times. The Statements of Support for the parish and Outreach Mission summarize the major sources of revenues and expenditures for the last two years and our budget for this year. We have included a pie chart that reflects our total sources of cash received and cash disbursed for the past year.

This past year has been an extraordinary one in so many ways. We were witness to the start of the restoration of our magnificent worship space after Easter. We also launched our \$2.5 million *Moving Forward* Capital Campaign to help fund the \$11.3 million cost of the total project. Although we are closing in on our goal, we will not be able to start on the work to restore the stained glass in the nave of the church until our goal is met.

Although we operated in the black, please realize that the 17th Street rental income was dedicated for church restoration and placed in the Restoration Fund and in future years will be used to pay the loan payments on the \$6 million restoration loan. Without this income we would have realized a deficit of roughly \$170,000 meaning we would have had to dip into our reserves to finance operations.

Our major source of income comes from your offerings in the collection. After several years of steadily growing collections, last year we saw a drop of \$30,000 or 4.4%. Other support decreased by approximately \$260,000 or 12.6%. This was primarily related to decreases in Mission collections, donations and grants as well as declines in other income such as votive shrines and candles and weddings attributable to the closing of the church due to the restoration construction. Our operating expenses decreased by 4.4% during that same period to offset a portion of the decline in support; however our costs to operate our Outreach Mission increased primarily due to decreases in non-cash food grants. We have budgeted an increase of 3% in Sunday offerings this year, so we request that you prayerfully consider increasing your donation, if you can.

During the past year we completed a 10-year parish operating budget as part of our overall financing plan that helped secure a \$6 million loan to help fund our interior restoration. We believe that the plan helps to ensure the long term continuation of all of our existing programs. We are currently preparing a long term interior maintenance plan for the church that will help maintain our newly restored interior for years to come. This year's budget already includes additional funding for this purpose.

We acknowledge the trust placed in us by the pastor and the parish and commit ourselves to remain true to that trust and to always maintain credibility with the parish, the larger Church and society. We thank you once again for your support and for the sacrifices you make even in these most trying economic times on behalf of this wonderful parish.

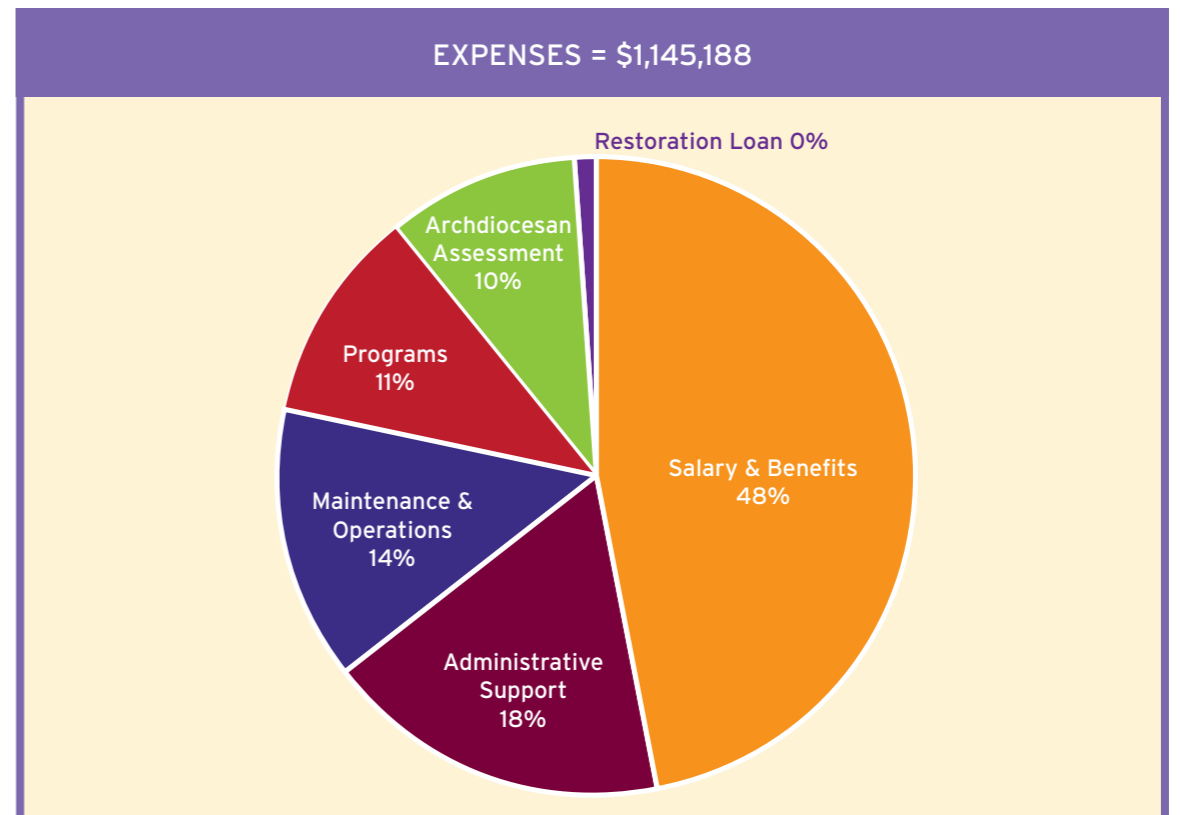
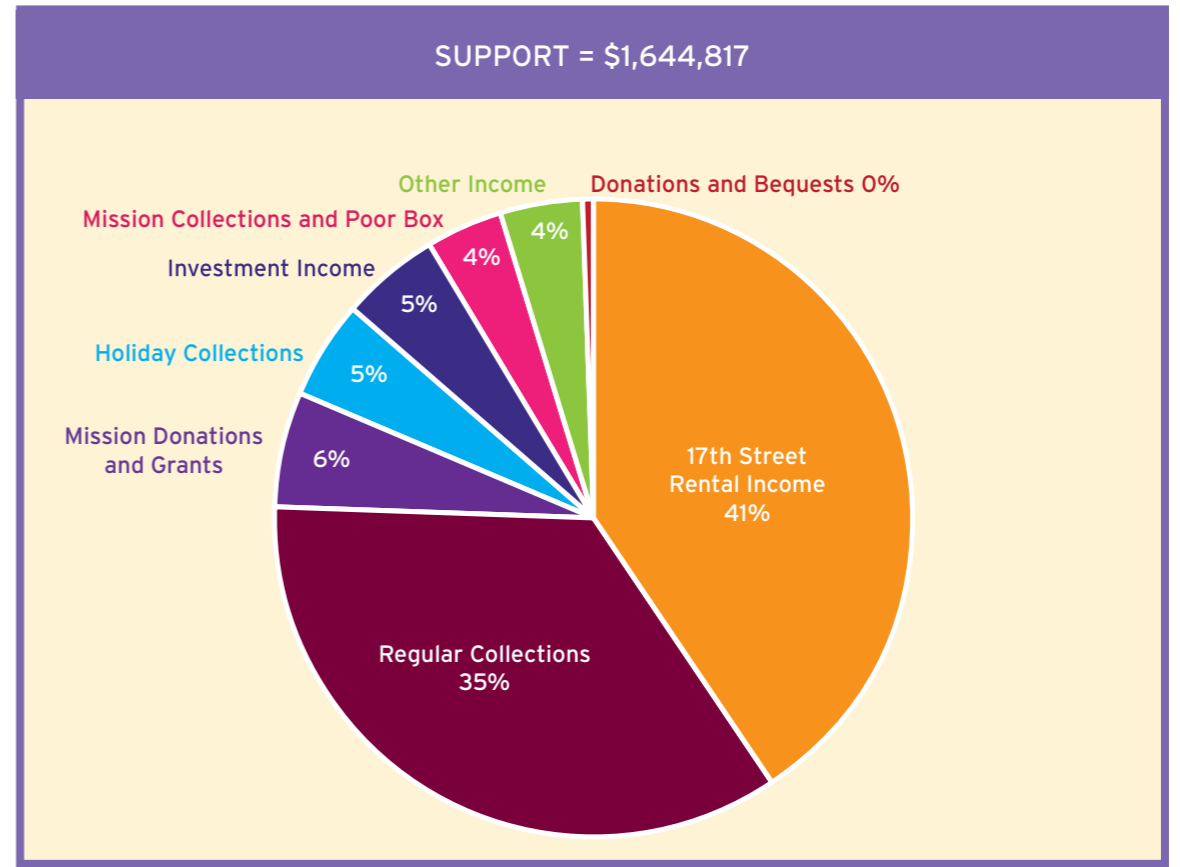

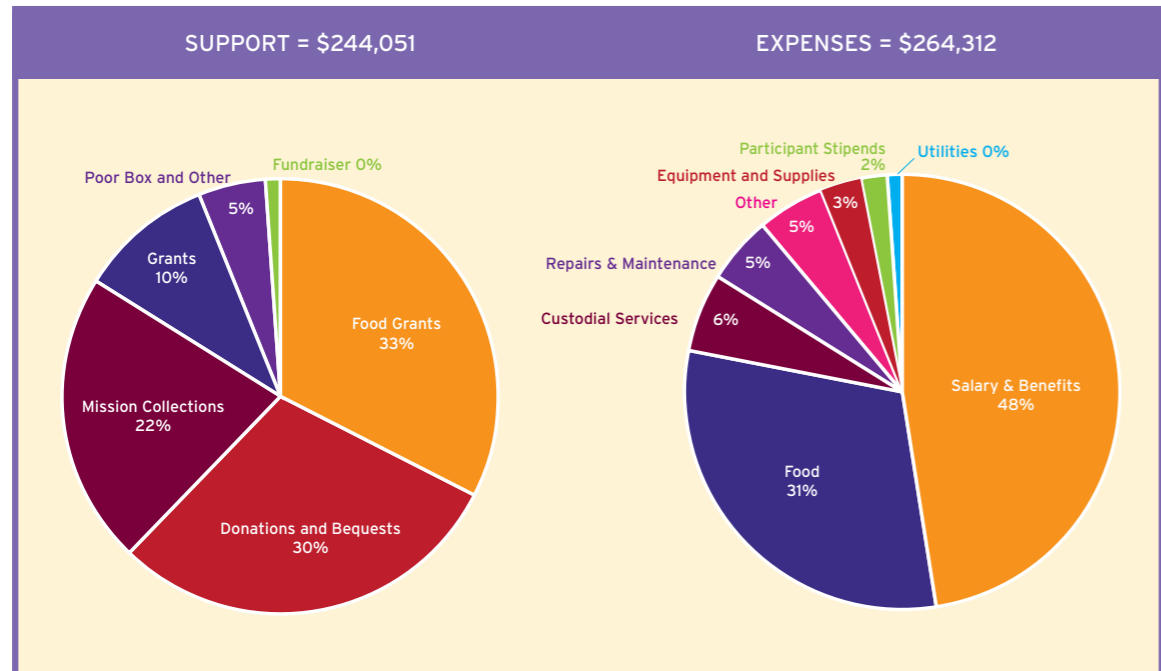

OUTREACH MISSION: HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR IN REVIEW

WELCOME TABLE SOUP KITCHEN

45,501 meals were served this past year, including 10,662 to seniors. The average weekly attendance increased to 892. This represents a 3% increase in the overall number of meals served.

FOOD PANTRIES

Served families representing 4,170 people, including 1,285 children and 667 seniors.

MEN'S SHELTER

More than 4,500 men were welcomed as guests in our facility that accommodates 15 men per night, 7 nights per week.

LIFE-SKILLS TRAINING & EMPOWERMENT PROGRAM

13 participants graduated from L-STEP over the course of two semesters.

ALL SAINTS CLOTHING ROOM

The Clothing Room distributed toiletries and clothing to 2,536 individuals.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Over the last year the Mission has made great strides in our efforts to Go Green. We were finally able purchase and install an industrial dishwasher and polycarbonate dishware for use during the Welcome Table soup kitchen on Sundays. These purchases have allowed us to greatly reduce our reliance on non-biodegradable Styrofoam products, as well as reduce our supply costs and the amount of garbage generated each week by the Welcome Table.

As a founding member of the Emergency Shelter Network Steering Committee, Xavier was an integral part of the hard-fought victory won by the network regarding our shelter system. We successfully negotiated with the Department of Homeless Services (DHS) regarding their proposed restructuring of our shelter system in order to maintain the standards of screening, transportation, fiscal responsibility and flexibility in scheduling that we rely on for the safety of our guests and volunteers. While we continue to negotiate with DHS over continuing issues within the faith-based network and the shelter system as a whole, achieving this particular goal ensured the continuation of our shelter network.

CHALLENGES IN THE YEAR AHEAD

As always, financial issues are our number one concern as we struggle to cover the costs of serving more and more people while private money becomes harder and harder to find. Our limited staff makes it difficult to pay the necessary amount of attention to the day-to-day programmatic aspects of the Mission while also seeking and applying for new avenues of funding.

In addition to financial issues, we are still concerned about our shelter and others like it. The Department of Homeless Services' restructuring of the Emergency Shelter Network has, in our opinion, been detrimental to the homeless population of New York City—specifically the men served by our shelter and others like it. We continue to be active in the ongoing dialogue with DHS and continue to explore new methods for dealing with the issue of homelessness in our city, a problem which has hit an all-time high over the last year.

As always, we ask for your continued gifts of time, talents and treasure to ensure the continuance of our programs. This year especially, we also ask for the gift of your voice raised in solidarity and support with the poor, homeless and hungry in our city.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN OVERVIEW

Looking back over the last year, I marvel at how much transformation has taken place in our worship space, our community and our hearts. Determining how best to meet our goal really started with our devoted Development Committee. While I was away during the 2008 Holidays I missed a committee meeting. It was at that meeting that my name surfaced as a potentially good fit for the emerging job of Capital Campaign Director. As the old adage goes, that's why you never miss a meeting or else you may be nominated for something in absentia!



In February 2009, I started strategizing in earnest how best to raise at least \$2.5M in an economy that many were calling the worst since the Great Depression. The first strategy was to avoid television and any news about the depressing economy. The intention was not to hide my head in the sand, but to avoid any negativity seeping into my consciousness. The next was to set out communicating a consistent message of love, inviting everyone to participate in an historic event that was unfolding before our very fortunate eyes. God was bigger than the depressed economy and I was determined to hold on to that.

In May, during our cocktail receptions, many people saw first-hand the great need for renovation and restoration of our magnificent Church. With spotlight in hand, I pointed out major structural issues while Fr. Joe, with laser pointer in hand, discussed the plans for restoring them. A weekly bulletin section, "Capital Campaign Communications" and a web site, www.sfxavier.org/movingforward were created to keep everyone updated.

Soon after the official launch of the Campaign, many volunteers graciously began to offer their services ranging from church tours highlighting our rich history and the need to restore the Church, to our commemorative booklet, to the behemoth administrative task of entering mountains of data. We also conducted a phone-a-thon that included more than 20 volunteers who dialed more than 1,000 phone numbers in the waning days of summer. In the fall, the 3 R's pledge drive began and included parishioners sharing why they participated financially in the campaign. This four-week pledge drive netted nearly \$500,000.

Next, we began a mini-campaign focused on end-of-year giving and the tax advantages available to donors. As a result, another \$500,000 was raised by year's end. In total, we received nearly \$1M in pledges and donations (many of which were done via ParishPay, a terrific "green" option saving much money and paper) in less than 2 months! Thanks to you, the parishioners and friends of Xavier! Thanks be to God!

So, as we stand at the brink of our \$2.5M goal, I can't help but think of two things: Love and Grace. Love from you, the parishioners and friends of this dynamic and inclusive community; and Grace from God. These are what truly made this campaign a success. As one parishioner so eloquently wrote, in her story in the bulletin and on our web site, after her first visit to Xavier, "...in quiet joy I released my held breath; finally, a place that practices what Jesus teaches."

And so now, we can release our collectively held breath, and live the Renewal, the Renovation and the Restoration that God's grace and our love have made possible.

CASH AND CHECK

SECURITIES

By giving appreciated securities that you have owned for more than a year, your charitable deduction is the fair market value of the securities. Such gifts provide income tax savings and eliminate the capital gains tax liability.

GIFTS BY WILL

The parish can be remembered in your Will. Suggested wording for such bequests is: I give the sum of \$_____ (or _____% of my estate) to the Church of St. Francis Xavier, 55 West 15th Street in New York City, for its general purposes (or for something more specific of your choosing).

GIFTS OF RETIREMENT PLANS

Naming the Church of St. Francis Xavier, 55 West 15th Street in New York City, as a beneficiary or contingent beneficiary in your retirement plan, IRA or 401(k) is easy, requires no attorneys or fee, and is tax advantageous.

ENVELOPE SYSTEM

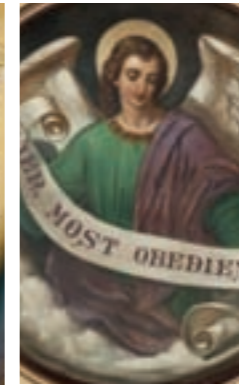
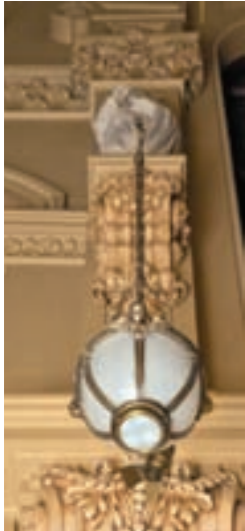
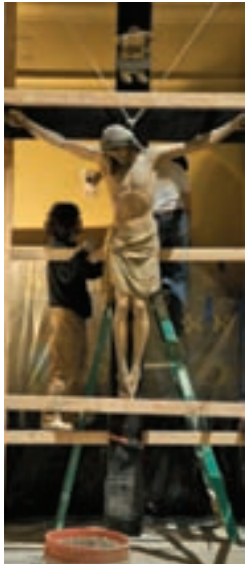
Use of the envelopes helps the parish keep better records and allows us to be better informed for our budgeting process and our long range fiscal planning. Using the envelope provides you with an end-of-the-year statement which can be used for income tax reporting of charitable donations.

PARISH PAY

Implemented in 2007, this program allows you to support the parish ON-LINE.
